Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31 August 2021

The trustees present their annual report together with the financial statements and auditor's report of the charitable company for the year 1 September 2020 to 31 August 2021. The annual report serves the purposes of both a trustees' report, and a directors' report under company law.

The academy trust operates a single academy, By Brook Valley C of E Primary School, for pupils aged 4 to 11, serving a catchment area which includes the villages of Biddestone, Nettleton and Burton, Castle Combe and Yatton Keynell. The school has a pupil capacity of 210 and had a roll of 191 in the school census in October 2020.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

The principal object and activity of the Charitable Company, as outlined in the Trusts' Articles of Association, is the operation of the By Brook Valley C of E Primary School to advance, for the Public Benefit, education in the United Kingdom, in particular but without prejudice to the generality of the foregoing by establishing, maintaining, carrying on, managing and developing a school with a designated Church of England religious character offering a broad and balanced curriculum conducted in accordance with the principles, practices and tenets of the Church of England both generally and in particular in relation to arranging for religious education and daily acts of worship (as required by the Funding Agreement) and in having regard to the advice of the Diocesan Board of Education.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives, strategies and activities

School organisation

This year we continued to operate with seven classes, averaging 200 children across the year. We retained our specialist music teacher, sports coaches and play and speech therapists. In January and February 2021 we restructured the school office, appointing a new finance and HR officer and removing the post of contracts administrator. This has supported the effective running of school administration.

A number of new pupils joined the school across the year and the school continues to have a strong reputation within the local community.

Leadership

In August 2020, our longstanding headteacher retired and I was recruited starting September 2020.

The leadership team now consisted of the Head teacher, Deputy Head teacher and the SENDco. In my first year, the focus was very much on relationships, building a culture of trust, high expectations; and distributed leadership through support and challenge for all. There was also a specific focus on developing staff at all levels as leaders and how to maximise the effective of TAs to support learning.

In January 2021, I faced the challenge of the school HR and Finance officer resigning to take up a new position at another school. The first round of applications did not provide a strong field so the post was readvertised and Cathryn MacDougall was appointed to the position in March 2021. Cathryn is working closely with Nicola Phillips, our office manager and they are working in good partnership.

In March 2021, Keith Ernest, our CoG also resigned and Lisa Nicolson stepped up to be the new chair. Lisa Nicolson resigned 1 November 2021 and Rosemary Alison Jago was appointed chair in her stead.

Supportive partnerships were built with other local schools, other stand alone church academies and the local secondary school ready to build further links in the future. The partnership with the church and the diocese was sustained. I was also part of a LA induction programme for new Wiltshire Head teacher's and also was assigned a HT mentor to work with in my first year in role.

As a governing body, we reviewed the purpose and processes of governor visits to school.

Achievements

Despite the restrictions in place, the school continued to enrich the core curriculum as much as possible. These enrichment opportunities included:

- Additional sports clubs including Bath Rugby, Biddestone Cricket club and Chippenham Sports Partnership. Although parents could not attend, our annual sports day took place
- Forest school being introduced and every year group across the school accessed throughout the year. This included developing a new forest school area
- Year 6 pupils participated In their PGL residential trip
- All year groups went on a visit to support their topic work
- Bikeability and road safety
- Experience Church for all of KS2
- Worship with Rev. Anjali, Rev. Marc and Trevor Ranger continued either online or in person. Rev. Anjali also visited the school to support the RE teaching
- The school began a sustainable project developing the village pond

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

- FoBBVs (Friends of By Brook Valley) ran a number of events to fund raise for the school including a very successful run 1000km collectively as a school community in a day; cycle event at Castle Combe and a car boot sale. Parents also supported the school by purchasing copies of core texts to support reading and writing.
- The school secured funding from the Diocese and local churches to develop the space behind the Year 5 & 6 classrooms to provide an additional area for learning and to provide an outside reflective space and planting area.
- Diwali Dance and drumming workshops for Y3/4
- Music lessons continued and our specialist music teacher worked throughout the school.

Our whole school priorities for 2020 - 2021 were:

To support academic learning and personal development, well-being and spirituality.

We were making good progress in Term 1 & 2 with our school improvement priorities, until the lockdown was announced at the beginning of Term 3. Staff had to re- focus their energies on remote learning and supporting vulnerable pupils and those of key workers who were still attending the school. In addition, a lot of work was put into supporting the children, families and staff with their well- being. Throughout the year, but especially during the lockdown period, all the staff worked tirelessly to ensure the pupils were able to access quality education. There was an increase in the number of pupils taught in school during the lockdown, in comparison to the first lockdown in the previous academic year.

Our remote learning plan was revised and updated in line with best practice and research and then through the lessons learned, we adapted our home learning policy and practices. Parent - Teacher consultations were also held virtually for the first time and this not only supported parents and staff well-being but allowed the school to ensure we followed the mitigation measures put in place.

Developmental Drop ins were introduced to support teachers and TAs in developing quality first teaching and sharing of best practice. This process also involved teachers and TAs given the opportunity to observe one another.

CPD also focused on developing leadership skills and being a successful curriculum leader.

The school priorities will remain a focus for the school as we move into the new academic year.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Post Covid-19 Lockdown

When the pupils returned in September then again in after the lockdown, the focus of the school was to be positive and to be supportive. The vast majority of pupils returned happy and settled really well back in to school life, despite being in bubbles and the additional mitigation measures in place. If any pupil needed help or support, intervention was put in place. Our Year 1 class also faced further disruption, post lockdown, due to long term absence of their class teacher and TA.

The 'Catch - up' premium funding was used to provide additional adult support in the classrooms to support maths and reading. We also funded a new whole school approach to early reading and spelling through the introduction of Sounds- Write, with all teachers receiving a comprehensive package of training in 2021. Additional sessions of ELSA added into the school day to support those who were in need of extra emotional support. Forest schools was also introduced.

There was no end of key phase or phonics data for 2020 - 2021 as tests did not go ahead. However, the school continued to assess attainment and progress throughout the year. Attainment and achievement data has been used to benchmark in order to ensure all pupils achieve at least inline or better and to target specific pupils to make accelerated progress.

Overall

86% of the EYFS cohort achieved a good level of development and were particularly strong in number Approximately 82% of Year 2 pupils achieved the pass mark for the phonics screening before Christmas and 100% had achieved by the end of the academic year.

Based on Teacher Assessment (supported by NFER Tests), standards of attainment across the school were broadly in line or above in terms of pupils working at expected level. Writing is an area for focus in 2021-2022. The Year 6 pupils were well prepared for and ready to transfer to secondary school.

Attendance throughout the year was high and the annual overall figure was 97.4%

Although there were many challenges in my first year as Head of BBV, it has been a very rewarding one and one to build upon as we move forward. Graham Pike, Headteacher

Public benefit

The trustees have complied with their duty to have due regard to public benefit guidance published by the Charities Commission in defining the strategic direction of the Academy.

Fundraising

The academy trust does not use any external fundraisers. All fundraising undertaken during the year was monitored by the Trustees. The academy occasionally applies for grants. FOBBVS, a separate organisation, raises funds from the community which are donated to the academy. The academy has not received any complaints regarding the fundraising of FOBBVS.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Achievements and performance and key performance indicators

Due to Covid-19 there were no standardised tests during this academic year. However, the school continued to assess attainment and progress throughout the year. This data will be used in 2021-22, as a benchmark, to ensure all children are achieving at least in line with prior attainment.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Financial review

Most of the Academy's income is obtained from the Education and Skills Funding Agency in the form of recurrent grants, the use of which is restricted to particular purposes. The grants received from the ESFA during the year ended 31 August 2021 are shown as restricted funds in the statement of financial activities.

In the year, total income of £968,000 was received and £1,141,000 expenditure incurred.

The academy made an in year deficit of £173,000 before recognised losses on the pension deficit of £168,000. At 31 August 2021 the actual position of reserves were £2,839,000 (being the total balance at 31 August on restricted general funds (excluding pension reserve) plus the balance on unrestricted funds).

The deficit on the defined benefit pension scheme increased from £338,000 to £554,000 leaving total funds at 31 August 2021 of £2,285,000.

Financial Objectives

The Academy's financial objectives are

o To ensure best value in respect of financial decisions, and o To ensure that all resources are used to promote pupil achievement

Investment policy and objectives

The school's investment policy requires that the Finance Officer monitors cash flow and the current account balance to ensure immediate financial commitments can be met (payroll and payments runs) and that the current account has adequate balances to meet forthcoming commitments. In practice a working balance of between £50,000 and £90,000 is likely to be maintained and the school will normally seek to avoid its current account going overdrawn. During the period under review, this policy was followed. Any change in Policy requires the approval of Governors via the Finance, Premises, Staffing & HR Committee.

Reserves policy

The governors aim to maintain free reserves of £35,000 to ensure that there is sufficient working capital to cover delays between spending and receipt of grants and to provide a cushion to deal with unexpected emergencies such as urgent maintenance. As at 31 August 2021, the Academy had free reserves (total funds less the amount held in fixed assets and restricted funds) of £66,000. The reserves held are in excess of the £35,000 required.

The total balance at 31 August 2021 on restricted general funds (excluding pension reserve) plus the balance on unrestricted funds, was £2,839,000.

In total at 31 August 2021, the funds of the academy were £2,285,000 which is represented by £2,219,000 of restricted funds and £66,000 unrestricted funds. £2,769,000 of the restricted funds can only be realised by disposing of tangible fixed assets.

The governors acknowledge the pension reserve deficit of £554,000 (2020: £338,000) and have increased the contributions in order to gradually reduce the liability.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Going concern

After making appropriate enquiries, the board of trustees has a reasonable expectation that the academy trust has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. For this reason, it continues to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements. Further details regarding the adoption of the going concern basis can be found in the Statement of Accounting Policies.

The trustees have further considered the use of going concern as appropriate in light of the COVID-19 pandemic. The school remains open, operating within the UK Government guidelines for educational establishments during this unprecedented period. The school's main source of income, the General Annual Grant is secured through the funding agreement with the ESFA. The trustees have approved an in-year deficit budget for 21/22. Sufficient reserves are carried forward from 31 August 2021 to show surplus general funds for at least 12 months from the date of approving these financial statements, thus they continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements.

Constitution

The academy trust is a company limited by guarantee and an exempt charity. The charitable company's memorandum and articles of association are the primary governing documents of the academy trust. The trustees of By Brook Valley Academy Trust are also the directors of the charitable company for the purposes of company law. The charitable company operates as By Brook Valley Academy Trust.

Details of the trustees who served during the year, and to the date these accounts are approved are included in the Reference and Administrative Details on page 1.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Members' liability

Each member of the charitable company undertakes to contribute to the assets of the company in the event of it being wound up while they are a member, or within one year after they cease to be a member, such amount as may be required, not exceeding £10 for the debts and liabilities contracted before they cease to be a member.

Trustees' Indemnities

The academy trust has opted into the Department for Education's risk protection arrangement (RPA), an alternative to insurance where UK government funds cover losses that arise. This scheme protects trustees and officers from claims arising from negligent acts, errors or omissions occurring while on academy business, and provides cover up to £10,000,000.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

Governors are subject to retirement by rotation but are eligible for re-election at the meeting at which they retire.

The Chair and Vice Chair are elected by the Governing Body, annually, at the first meeting of the year, from within their own number.

The Governors who were in office at 31 August 2021 and served throughout the period, except where shown, are listed in the Reference and Administrative Details section.

Organisational structure

The organisational structure of the Academy Trust consists of four levels:

- o Full Governing Body (Directors & Trustees)
- o Members
- o Senior Leadership Team
- o School Staff

The aim of this structure is to devolve responsibility and encourage involvement in decision making at all levels

The Governors are responsible for setting general policy, adopting an annual plan and budget, monitoring the school by the use of budgets and making major decisions about the direction of the school, capital expenditure and senior staff appointments.

The Senior Leadership Team consists of the Headteacher, a Deputy Headteacher and SENCo. These managers control the school at an executive level, implementing the policies laid down by the Governors, and reporting back to them. The Headteacher is responsible for appointment of staff, though all senior appointments also require the approval of the Governing Body. The Headteacher, (assisted by the Office Manager/ Finance & HR Officer), is responsible for authorisation of expenditure within agreed budgets.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Induction and training of new trustees

The training and induction provided for new Governors is dependent on their existing experience. Where necessary induction training is provided on charity and educational, legal and financial matters.

All new Governors are given a tour of the school and the opportunity to meet staff and pupils. All Governors are provided with copies of policies, procedures, minutes, accounts, Budget, plans, and other documents that they will require to undertake their role as Governors. Induction tends to be informal and is tailored specifically to the individual.

Key management remuneration

The Governing Body delegates (in accordance with its scheme of delegation) to its Pay Panel the responsibility for reviewing and determining staff salaries and for making recommendations to the Governing Body for the annual budget needed for pay. All teachers employed at By Brook Valley Academy Trust are paid in accordance with the statutory provisions of the School Teachers' Pay and Conditions Document (STPCD). All pay-related decisions are made taking full account of the school improvement plan and teachers and unions have been consulted on this policy.

The pay ranges for the headteacher and deputy headteachers are determined in accordance with the criteria specified in the STPCD 2020 (Section 2, Part 2 - leadership group pay).

The academy adheres to Local Government pay arrangements for support staff, and rates are based upon the pay range determined within the National Joint Council for Local Government Services.

Related parties and other connected charities and organisations

The Church of England via the Diocese of Bristol Academies Company is a foundation member of the academy trust.

The school is a member of the Chippenham Sports Partnership of Schools.

FUNDS HELD AS CUSTODIAN FOR OTHERS

There are currently no funds held as Custodian Trustee or on behalf of others.

PRINCIPAL RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES

The Governors understand and have complied with their duty and have identified and reviewed the risks to which the Academy is likely to be exposed. They have ensured that appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error.

The Major Risks to which the Academy is likely to be exposed have been assessed, in particular those relating to teaching and learning, the provision of facilities, and all other operational aspects of the school and its finances. The Governors continue to monitor internal systems to assess risk faced by the school, both in operational (e.g. Health and Safety, Teaching and Learning, Behaviour and School Trips) and in relation to the control of Finances.

A Risk Register is in place, which is subject to an annual review. In addition, a Business Continuity Plan has been developed. The highest risk items are identified and control procedures agreed by the Governing Body.

The Academy has an effective and robust system of internal controls in place working to the guidance of the Academies Financial Handbook including the following policies:

- o Finance Manual (containing all policies relating to control of income and expenditure and procurement)
- o Best Value Statement
- o Depreciation Policy 10
- o Write off of debt/disposal of equipment Policy

A Management Accounts report is provided to the Chair of Governors each month. The Finance Committee meets at least once per term to discuss the schools financial position in depth and, in turn, the Finance Committee briefs the Full Governing Body at the subsequent Trustees Meeting. The Governing Body has appointed a Responsible Officer, whose role is described in the Risk and Control Framework below.

An improvement in the backup procedure that allows for data to be stored securely offsite is in place for backing up school data on a daily basis. There is also a Fixed Asset Register and separate inventory for non-capital assets. These are reviewed on a regular basis.

Health and Safety inspections are carried out termly, and Health & Safety risk assessments are carried out annually and reviewed regularly. Reports are submitted to the Finance, Premises, Staffing & HR Committee regularly.

The Governing Body strives to ensure that all Academy financial transactions and educational responsibilities are managed within stringent guidelines as set by all relevant authorities (e.g. DFE, ESFA).

Scope of Responsibility

The board of the trustees has delegated the day-to-day responsibility to the Principal, as accounting officer, for ensuring financial controls conform with the requirements of both propriety and good financial management and in accordance with the requirements and responsibilities assigned to it in the funding agreement between By Brook Valley Academy Trust and the Secretary of State for Education. They are also responsible for reporting to the board of trustees any material weaknesses or breakdowns in internal control.

The governors continue to monitor their own performance during the year, one such way this is measured is the continued inclusion of a standing item at the end of each sub-committee meeting requesting that the committee reviews and records the impact of the meeting and how the meeting has "added value". These discussions are included in minutes and fed back to Full Governing Body meetings. The impact of this has been to ensure a constant process of self-evaluation, challenge and an improvement in the formal documentation of this process and the way in which it is fed back to the board.

Review of Value for Money

As accounting officer, the Headteacher has responsibility for ensuring that the academy trust delivers good value in the use of public resources. The accounting officer understands that value for money refers to the educational and wider societal outcomes achieved in return for the taxpayer resources received.

The accounting officer considers how the academy trust's use of its resources has provided good value for money during each academic year, and reports to the board of trustees where value for money can be improved, including the use of benchmarking data where appropriate. The accounting officer for the academy trust has delivered or improved value for money during the year as follows:

To facilitate virtual teacher- parent consultation meetings, the school invested in a platform called' SchoolCloud' . 'SchoolCloud' enabled the school to manage the evenings effectively, whilst parents were able to book appointments and then meet with teachers remotely through a video call. The teachers and SENco were able to manage their appointments and record notes ready for each consultation. The teaching staff were fully trained on using the platform and the helpline helped solve any issues. The school will continue to use 'SchoolCloud' for booking appointments and virtual appointments, when necessary in 2021- 2022.

With the lockdown announced early January 2021, to deliver our remote learning plan, the school introduced the use of Microsoft Teams to deliver online learning and enable pupils to submit assignments and teacher to offer feedback. The vulnerable pupils and those whose parents are key workers also used when learning in school. Teams was also used to support online staff and governor meetings throughout the lockdown and beyond until we were able to meet in person. On the return to school, the school has continued to use Teams to not only deliver our remote learning plan but our approach to home learning, which is detailed in the policy. All the teaching staff were trained to use Teams and our IT provider was used to set up the system.

Further platforms and applications were also introduced to support learning in school and at home. These included Tapestry for EYFS and Maths and Spelling Shed for all year groups. Again, the school has continued to use throughout 2020-2021 after the lockdown and plans to continue to use in 2021-2022.

To support all teachers and SLT with analysis of assessment data, the school invested in the online platform 'Insight'. The Insight platform has allowed all staff to analyse and report data more effectively, including individuals, cohorts, across the school and specific groups including Pupil Premium, SEN and gender. 'Insight' has also supported the teachers when they are writing their annual reports to parents.

To enhance Teaching and learning, including supporting interventions, the school signed a new lease agreement for 31 IPads that could be used in class and around school. 1 of the IPads is used by the Head teacher to monitor and evidence examples of teaching and learning.

ParentPay has been used by the admin team, FoBBVs (Friends of BBV) and parents to greater effect to manage payments to school more than just school dinners as previously. This has proved an effective tool to manage any transactions and has proved to be more time efficient.

The Purpose of the System of Internal Control

The system of internal control is designed to manage risk to a reasonable level rather than to eliminate all risk of failure to achieve policies, aims and objectives. It can therefore only provide reasonable and not absolute assurance of effectiveness. Capacity to Handle Risk

The board of trustees has reviewed the key risks to which the charitable company is exposed together with the operating, financial and compliance controls that have been implemented to mitigate those risks. The board of trustees is of the view that there is a formal on-going process for identifying, evaluating and managing the charitable company's significant risks that has been in place for the period 1 September 2020 to 31 August 2021 and up to the date of approval of the annual report and financial statements. This process is regularly reviewed by the board of trustees.

Governance Statement for the Year Ended 31 August 2021

The Risk and Control Framework

The academy trust's system of internal financial control is based on a framework of regular management information and administrative procedures including the segregation of duties and a system of delegation and accountability. In particular, it includes:

- comprehensive budgeting and monitoring systems with an annual budget and periodic financial reports which are reviewed and agreed by the board of trustees
- regular reviews by the Finance, Premises, Staffing and HR Committee of reports which indicate financial performance against the forecasts and of major purchase plans, capital works and expenditure programmes
- setting targets to measure financial and other performance
- clearly defined purchasing (asset purchase or capital investment) guidelines
- Delegation of authority and segregation of duties and
- identification and management of risks

The board of trustees has considered the need for a specific internal audit function and has decided:

To not appoint an internal auditor but to appoint a Wiltshire Council Accounting Technician to undertake additional checks.

The external reviewer's role includes giving advice on financial and other matters and performing a range of checks on the academy trust's financial and other systems. In particular, the checks carried out in the current period included:

- Financial Monitoring
- Schools Resource Management
- Self-Assessment Checklist

On a quarterly basis, the external reviewer reports to the board of trustees, through filing a report with the Finance, Premises, Staffing and HR Committee, on the operation of the systems of control and on the discharge of the board of trustees' financial responsibilities. The external reviewer was not able to deliver their full schedule of work as planned for the period due to Covid-19.

Review of Effectiveness

As accounting officer, the Headteacher has responsibility for reviewing the effectiveness of the system of internal control. During the year in question the review has been informed by:

- the work of the independent external reviewer provided by Wiltshire Council.
- the work of the external auditor
- the financial management and governance self-assessment process or the school resource management self-assessment tool
- the work of the school business manager/finance officer within the academy trust who have responsibility for the development and maintenance of the internal control framework

The accounting officer has been advised of the implications of the result of their review of the system of internal control by the Finance, Premises, Staffing & HR Committee and a plan to address weaknesses and ensure continuous improvement of the system is in place.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland', the Academies Accounts Direction 2020 to 2021 issued by the ESFA, the Charities Act 2011 and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

By Brook Valley Academy Trust meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling which is the functional currency of the academy and rounded to the nearest thousand pound.

Going concern

The trustees assess whether the use of going concern is appropriate i.e. whether there are any material uncertainties related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the ability of the company to continue as a going concern. The trustees make this assessment in respect of a period of at least one year from the date of authorisation for issue of the financial statements and have concluded that the academy trust has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future and there are no material uncertainties about the academy trust's ability to continue as a going concern, thus they continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements.

The trustees have further considered the use of going concern as appropriate in light of the COVID-19 pandemic. The school remains open, operating within the UK Government guidelines for educational establishments during this unprecedented period. The school's main source of income, the General Annual Grant is secured through the funding agreement with the ESFA. The trustees have approved an in-year deficit budget for 21/22. Sufficient reserves are carried forward from 31 August 2021 to show surplus general funds for at least 12 months from the date of approving these financial statements, thus they continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements.

Critical accounting judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

Estimates and judgements are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

Critical accounting estimates and assumptions

The academy trust makes estimates and assumptions concerning the future. The resulting accounting estimates and assumptions will, by definition, seldom equal the related actual results. The estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year are discussed below.

Critical accounting judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

The present value of the Local Government Pension Scheme defined benefit liability depends on a number of factors that are determined on an actuarial basis using a variety of assumptions. The assumptions used in determining the net cost (income) for pensions include the discount rate. Any changes in these assumptions, which are disclosed in note 17, will impact the carrying amount of the pension liability. Furthermore, a roll forward approach which projects results from the latest full actuarial valuation performed at 31 March 2016 has been used by the actuary in valuing the pensions liability at 31 August 2021. Any differences between the figures derived from the roll forward approach and a full actuarial valuation would impact on the carrying amount of the pension liability.

There are no critical areas of judgement.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Grants

Grants are included in the Statement of Financial Activities on a receivable basis. The balance of income received for specific purposes but not expended during the period is shown in the relevant funds on the balance sheet. Where income is received in advance of meeting any performance-related conditions there is not unconditional entitlement to the income and its recognition is deferred and included in creditors as deferred income until the performance-related conditions are met. Where entitlement occurs before income is received, the income is accrued.

General Annual Grant is recognised in full in the Statement of Financial Activities in the year for which it is receivable and any abatement in respect of the period is deducted from income and recognised as a liability.

Capital grants are recognised in full when there is an unconditional entitlement to the grant. Unspent amounts of capital grants are reflected in the balance sheet in the restricted fixed asset fund. Capital grants are recognised when there is entitlement and are not deferred over the life of the asset on which they are expended.

Donations

Donations are recognised on a receivable basis (where there are no performance related conditions), where it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Other income

Other income including the hire of facilities, is recognised in the period it is receivable and to the extent the charity has provided the goods or services.

Notes to the Financial Statements - continued for the Year Ended 31 August 2021

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

All resources expended are inclusive of irrecoverable VAT.

Charitable activities

Costs of charitable activities are incurred on the charity's educational operations, including support costs and costs relating to the governance of the charity apportioned to charitable activities.

Tangible fixed assets

Assets costing £1,000 or more are capitalised as tangible fixed assets and are carried at cost, net of depreciation and any provision for impairment.

Where tangible fixed assets have been acquired with the aid of specific grants, either from the government of from the private sector, the are included in the Balance Sheet at cost and depreciated over their expected useful economic life. Where there are specific conditions attached to the funding requiring the continued use of the asset, the related grants are credited to a restricted fixed asset fund in the Statement of Financial Activities and carried forward in the Balance Sheet. Depreciation on the relevant assets is charged directly to the restricted fixed asset fund in the Statement of Financial Activities. Where tangible assets have been acquired with unrestricted funds, depreciation on such assets is charged to the unrestricted fund.

Depreciation is provided on all tangible fixed assets other than freehold land, at rates calculated to write off the cost of each asset on a straight-line basis over its useful expected lives. Where an asset comprises of two or more components which have substantially different lives each component is depreciated over its useful economic life. The expected useful lives are as follows:

Long leasehold buildings 15 to 100 years Property improvements 10 to 100 years

Fixtures, fittings and equipment 3 years ICT equipment 3 years

Assets in the course of construction are included at cost. Depreciation on these assets is not charged until they are brought into use.

A review for impairment of a fixed asset is carried out if events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying value of any fixed asset may not be recoverable. Shortfalls between the carrying value of fixed assets and their recoverable amounts are recognised as impairments. Impairment losses are recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities.

Tangible fixed assets

The leasehold land and buildings (being the school buildings) were transferred to the Academy on a 125 year lease from Wiltshire Council. The property is included at the insurance valuation upon conversion. Other assets on transfer have been valued at cost when purchased shortly prior to the formation of the academy.

Financial instruments

The academy trust only holds basic financial instruments as defined in FRS 102. The financial assets and financial liabilities of the academy trust and their measurement basis are as follows:

Financial assets - trade and other debtors are basic financial instruments and are debt instruments measured at amortised cost as detailed in note 16. Prepayments are not financial instruments.

Cash at bank - is classified as a basic financial instrument and is measured at face value.

Financial liabilities - trade creditors, accruals and other creditors are financial instruments, and are measured at amortised cost as detailed in notes 14 and 15. Taxation and social security are not included in the financial instruments disclosure definition. Deferred income is not deemed to be a financial liability, as the cash settlement has already taken place and there is an obligation to deliver services rather than cash or another financial instrument.

Stocks

Stock consists of purchased goods for resale including uniforms as well as other items held for future use. Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

Taxation

The academy trust is considered to pass the tests set out in Paragraph 1 Schedule 6 of the Finance Act 2010 and therefore it meets the definition of a charitable company for UK corporation tax purposes.

Accordingly, the academy trust is potentially exempt from taxation in respect of income or capital gains received within categories covered by part 11, chapter 3 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 or Section 256 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992, to the extent that such income or gains are applied exclusively to charitable purposes.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted income funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted fixed asset funds can only be used for particular restricted capital purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

Retirement benefits to employees of the academy trust are provided by the Teachers' Pension Scheme ('TPS') and the Local Government Pension Scheme ('LGPS'). These are defined benefit schemes.

The TPS is an unfunded scheme and contributions are calculated to spread the cost of pensions over employees' working lives with the academy trust in such a way that the pension cost is a substantially level percentage of current and future pensionable payroll. The contributions are determined by the Government Actuary based on quadrennial valuations using a prospective unit credit method. TPS is an unfunded multi-employer scheme with no underlying assets to assign between employers. Consequently, the TPS is treated as a defined contribution scheme for accounting purposes and the contributions recognised in the period to which they relate.

The LGPS is a funded multi-employer scheme and the assets are held separately from those of the academy trust in separate trustee administered funds. Pension scheme assets are measured at fair value and liabilities are measured on an actuarial basis using the projected unit credit method and discounted at a rate equivalent to the current rate of return on a high quality corporate bond of equivalent term and currency to the liabilities. The actuarial valuations are obtained at least triennially and are updated at each balance sheet date. The amounts charged to net income/(expenditure) are the current service costs and the costs of scheme introductions, benefit changes, settlements and curtailments. They are included as part of staff costs as incurred. Net interest on the net defined benefit liability/asset is also recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities and comprises the interest cost on the defined benefit obligation and interest income on the scheme assets, calculated by multiplying the fair value of the scheme assets at the beginning of the period by the rate used to discount the benefit obligations. The difference between the interest income on the scheme assets and the actual return on the scheme assets is recognised in other recognised gains and losses.

Actuarial gains and losses are recognised immediately in other recognised gains and losses.

Liabilities

Liabilities are recognised when there is an obligation at the balance sheet date as a result of a past event, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefit will be required in settlement, and the amount of the settlement can be estimated reliably. Liabilities are recognised at the amount that the academy trust anticipates it will pay to settle the debt or the amount it has received as advanced payments for the goods or services it must provide.

Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the academy trust has an obligation at the reporting date as a result of a past event which it is probable will result in the transfer of economic benefits and the obligation can be estimated reliably.

Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation. Where the effect of the time value of money is material, the provision is based on the present value of those amounts, discounted at the pre-tax discount rate that reflects the risks specific to the liability. The unwinding of the discount is recognised within interest payable and similar charges.

General Annual Grant (GAG) - is applied in strict accordance with the terms of the Model Funding Agreement. Under the funding agreement with the Secretary of State for Education, the academy trust was not subject to a limit on the amount of GAG that it could carry forward at 31 August 2021.

DfE Group grants - these include:

- PE grant to fund improvements to the provision of PE and sports for primary pupils
- the rates relief to contribute to the rates bill
- the grant towards the universal infant free school meals provision
- a grant as part of the school's National Support School status to pay for due diligence activity for deployments funded through the school-to-school support fund
- the grant towards teachers' pay

DfE Group grants - Pupil premium - the pupil premium is used to assist pupils from low income families.

Other government grants - that is the special education needs funding from Wiltshire County Council.

Other income - this is donations received that are restricted for various purposes.

Pension reserve - this deficit represents the net shortfall in funds in the Local Government Pension Scheme in relation to employees past and present.

DfE Group capital grants - this represents funding specifically provided to support capital expenditure on fixed assets.

Other capital grants/donations - this represents the donations received for the purchase of fixed assets.

Fixed assets on conversion - this represents the value of land, buildings and other assets transferred from the Local Authority to the academy on conversion less depreciation.

Capital expenditure from GAG - this represents the cost less depreciation of assets purchased from the GAG.

17. PENSION AND SIMILAR OBLIGATIONS

Teachers' pension scheme

The Teachers' Pension Scheme (TPS) is a statutory, contributory, defined benefit scheme, governed by the Teachers' Pension Scheme Regulations 2014. Membership is automatic for teachers in academies. All teachers have the option to opt-out of the TPS following enrolment.

The TPS is an unfunded scheme to which both the member and employer makes contributions, as a percentage of salary - these contributions are credited to the Exchequer. Retirement and other pension benefits are paid by public funds provided by Parliament.

17. PENSION AND SIMILAR OBLIGATIONS - continued

Valuation of the teachers' pension scheme

The Government Actuary, using normal actuarial principles, conducts a formal actuarial review of the TPS in accordance with the Public Service Pensions (Valuations and Employer Cost Cap) Directions 2014 published by HM Treasury every 4 years. The aim of the review is to specify the level of future contributions. Actuarial scheme valuations are dependent on assumptions about the value of future costs, design of benefits and many other factors. The latest actuarial valuation of the TPS was carried out as at 31 March 2016. The valuation report was published by the Department for Education on 5 March 2019. The key elements of the valuation and subsequent consultation are:

- employer contribution rates set at 23.68% of pensionable pay (including a 0.08% administration levv)
- total scheme liabilities (pensions currently in payment and the estimated cost of future benefits) for service to the effective date of £218,100 million and notional assets (estimated future contributions together with the notional investments held at the valuation date) of £196,100 million, giving a notional past service deficit of £22,000 million
- the SCAPE rate, set by HMT, is used to determine the notional investment return. The current SCAPE rate is 2.4% above the rate of CPI. The assumed real rate of return is 2.4% in excess of prices and 2% in excess of earnings. The rate of real earnings growth is assumed to be 2.2%. The assumed nominal rate of return including earnings growth is 4.45%.

The next valuation result is due to be implemented from 1 April 2023.

The employer's pension costs paid to TPS in the period amounted to £91,000 (2020 - £89,000).

A copy of the valuation report and supporting documentation is on the Teachers' Pensions website.

Under the definitions set out in FRS 102, the TPS is an unfunded multi-employer pension scheme. The charity has accounted for its contributions to the scheme as if it were a defined contribution scheme. The charity has set out above the information available on the scheme.

Local government pension scheme

The LGPS is a funded defined benefit pension scheme, with the assets held in separate trustee-administered funds. The total contribution made for the year was £57,000 of which employer's contributions totalled £47,000 and employees' contributions totalled £10,000. The agreed contribution rates for future years are 23.7 per cent for employers and 5.5 to 9.9 per cent for employees.

Parliament has agreed, at the request of the Secretary of State for Education, to a guarantee that, in the event of an academy trust closure, outstanding Local Government Pension Scheme liabilities would be met by the Department for Education. The guarantee came into force on 18 July 2013.
